

Safe Use of Antibiotics

What do strep throat, an ear infection, and a urinary tract infection have in common? They can be cured using antibiotics. Antibiotics are medicines used to treat infections caused by bacteria. These medicines kill the bacteria and thus cure the infection.

Common confusions about antibiotics are that they can cure other illnesses like the common cold or flu; however, this is incorrect. Colds and the flu along with bronchitis and runny noses are usually caused by viruses. Viruses cannot be killed by antibiotics.

So why not take antibiotics just to be safe? Taking antibiotics when you do not need them can be dangerous. According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC) this will not make you feel better, will not prevent others from becoming ill, and will not make you feel better. It can also cause bacteria to become resistant to antibiotics and make future infections harder to treat not only for you but also for others. It is key to take antibiotics only when your infection is caused by a bacterium.

Some ways to make sure that antibiotics are the correct medicine for you is to ask your doctor or health care provider if antibiotics are the best cure for you. If you feel ill, do not pressure your doctor into prescribing you antibiotics. Instead, ask if there are other ways to make you feel better without antibiotics. If a friend or family member gives you their leftover antibiotics, do not take them. Doing so can delay your treatment and allow

your illness to get worse. They were not prescribed for your illness, and antibiotics are made to treat specific types of illnesses.

There are some important things to remember when taking antibiotics. Be careful not to skip your doses, and take them when and how your doctor says to. Some antibiotics should be taken after eating to prevent nausea while others may be taken on an empty stomach to increase effectiveness. When they are prescribed, your health care provider will instruct you on when to take them. Contact your doctor if you have specific questions about what to eat and what not to eat while taking your antibiotic. If you have leftover medicine after you finish your prescribed does, then discard them. Do not give family members or friends leftover medicine. Some common side effects that occur with antibiotic use are nausea, stomach pain, and diarrhea. If any of these side effects become a problem, then notify your doctor.

Antibiotics are great when used correctly and safely. If you have questions about antibiotic use or to find out if they are right for you, then contact your doctor. The CDC also has great resources on their website about safe antibiotic use.

**Marie's Kitchen  
Mexican Chicken**

- 1 chicken (cut up)
- 1 lg. green pepper (chopped)
- 1 lg. onion (chopped)
- 1 sm. can chicken broth
- 2 sm cans diced tomatoes
- garlic powder, cumin, chili powder (to taste)



First, saute green pepper and onion till tender. Add tomatoes, garlic powder, cumin, chili powder and chicken broth. Simmer about 20 minutes.

Next, roll chicken in flour, place skin side down in hot skillet with about 1/2 cup oil. Brown chicken about 4 minutes on each side. Place in sauce. Cook on low about 1 hour or until chicken is tender. Take chicken out. Put on cookie sheet. Cover with cheddar cheese. Put in oven at 350 for 5 minutes.

Cook some rice (2 cups rice/5 cups water). Put chicken pieces and sauce on rice.

**Words of Wisdom - NOT!**


Since most of our good people in this area are plain spoken, I feel the need to warn you of those few who might try to use big words to convince you they are smarter than the rest of us.

## Getting to Know Your Antibiotics By Celia Westfall, Student Nurse, University of Florida, College of Nursing

**H**ave you ever been sick and been prescribed antibiotics by your doctor? This medicine helps your body fight off microorganisms called bacteria. These bacteria can get into your body and disrupt its normal function, leaving you feeling sick. Here are some common questions and important things to consider when taking antibiotics:

### Can I still take my normal medications?

It depends on what you are taking. Make sure the doctor that wrote your antibiotic prescription knows about all of the other drugs you are taking, including over-the-counter medications, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Antibiotics reduce the effectiveness of birth control medication; make sure to use another form of birth control such as condoms while you are taking antibiotics.

### What food can I eat with antibiotics?

There are not many known harmful interactions between foods and antibiotics. However, alcohol can interfere with antibiotics and should be avoided. Some antibiotics should be taken with food, while others on an empty stomach. Make sure you know which is advised for the particular antibiotic you are on and be sure to follow it. If not taken correctly, antibiotics may not be as effective or may cause upset stomach. Antibiotics kill both bad and good bacteria. We are always in contact with good or normal bacteria known as normal flora that do not make us sick and even help

our bodies function. Taking antibiotics can kill these beneficial bacteria. Eating yogurt can help restore these helpful bacteria that are destroyed from antibiotic use.

### Can antibiotics make me sick?

As with any medication, some can get sick from antibiotics. This is not common, however, and antibiotics have saved many people's lives. The main problem that occurs with antibiotic use is allergic reactions. Make sure to inform your doctor if you have any allergies to medications or foods. Some common symptoms of allergic reactions to antibiotics are hives, itching, swelling and flushing; if you experience any of these symptoms, contact your health care provider immediately. If you experience problems with breathing, call 911.

### Where should I store antibiotics?

Some antibiotics must be kept in the refrigerator. Make sure you know where your particular antibiotic prescription can be stored. It is generally best to keep them in cool, dry places away from sunlight. It may also be helpful to keep them in a visible place so you do not forget to take them. As with any medication, be sure to keep them out of reach of children.

### When can I stop taking the antibiotics?

Antibiotics should always be taken exactly as prescribed. It is very important to finish the full prescription of antibiotics. Even if you are feeling better, it is likely there are still some living bacteria if you have not finished the entire prescription. If the antibiotics are not finished, these living bacteria can survive and grow and make you sick again or become resistant to the antibiotic. Resistance is a problem for everyone because once people get sick with a resistant bacteria, it is harder to kill that bacteria and harder for people to get well.

## 100 Years Ago

1911

April 5 -

In one of the largest union labor demonstrations in the United States to that time, a group of 120,000 employees took the day off and marched in the rain along Fifth Avenue in New York City in a memorial service for the 146 victims of the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire that had happened on March 25. The procession lasted for three hours and was watched by 400,000 spectators.

April 6 - Mayor of Baltimore, Mahool, signed into law an ordinance prohibiting African-Americans from moving into, or establishing businesses, in white neighborhoods

April 11 - Mae West, 17, married musician, Frank Wallace; they separated after a few months, but never divorced, until after Wallace resurfaced in 1935.

April 12 - The shortest major league baseball game ever, the season opener



between the visiting Philadelphia Phillies at the New York Giants' stadium, the Polo Grounds, was completed in 50 minutes with the Phillies winning 2-0. On September 28, 1919, the same two teams would play a game that lasted 51 minutes. The very next day, the Phillies and Giants played an 18 inning game, and the Polo Grounds burned to the ground that night.

April 17 - The record was set for the highest number of immigrants



—11,745—being processed in a single day through the U.S. Bureau of Immigration station at Ellis Island.

April 26 - The town of Goldsboro, Florida, was abolished by the state legislature after the nearby city of Sanford had failed to secure its annexation. The two cities were then replaced by a newly chartered Sanford, Florida.

## CITY OF WALDO NEWS:

Proclamation 2011-02 was passed at the March Council meeting proclaiming April 2011 as **WATER CONSERVATION MONTH**. Water is becoming a precious resource. It is important to conserve water. Also, by conserving water you can save on your water utility bill. Listed below are some ways to save on water.

- Installing low flow toilets and faucets.
- Take short showers instead of baths.
- Test your toilet bowl tank...add 12 drops of food coloring to your toilet tank, wait 1 hour. Look to see if any color has seeped through the tank, a fitting or into the toilet bowl. If so you may have a leak.
- Cook smart, peel and clean veggies in a bowl of water instead of under running water.
- Wet your tooth brush and then turn off the water while brushing your teeth.

There are many more ideas on water conservation on the web. Just Google, "water conservation tips" and educate yourself.

Two new restaurants opened in Waldo. "Wings n Thangs," on North 301 and "Buddy's Pizza," on South 301. The third, Subway, on North 301 is scheduled to open soon.

### WASTEWATER PLANT

Due to new Department of Environmental Protection stringent rules, the City of Waldo could not build a larger plant at the current wastewater plant site. The current wastewater plant is under a DEP consent order, which requires Waldo to either build a new wastewater plant or come up with an alternative source of getting rid of the wastewater. The City had to look at alternatives and is moving forward with a wastewater line to the City of

Gainesville with GRU. The line will allow the City of Waldo to eventually double the capacity which will allow growth in Waldo. The cost of this line will raise the wastewater portion of your utility bill approx. 30-50%. The City of Waldo is going for a USDA loan/grant for funds and will also pursue other avenues for funding if they become available.

The City of Waldo is currently installing a new accounting/software system. Please be patient with staff as we will be going through a learning curve. There also may be unintentional delays with bills and readings due to the software changes. Thank you in advance for working with us.

### SPRING SAFETY FROM THE DESK OF CHIEF MIKE SZABO

It's that time of year again. For me it's the pollen and my new found



friend, his name is "Claritin". I see him twice a day when it's bad. It helps.

I hope the start of the New Year is going good for you. So far for the Police Department things are going well. I wanted to take a few minuets of your time to remind everyone to make sure when leaving doors and windows open for fresh air, be sure to lock them up when done.

Drive with caution, spring sees more traffic as it is "Spring Break" time, and individuals taking vacation. Many collisions also occur during spring fawning, when yearling deer are seeking out new home ranges. Regardless of the time of year, motorists should be aware of the potential for deer to cross roads at anytime. Taking proper precautions like driving slow

during evening and nighttime hours and scanning roadsides for deer can prevent many of these accidents from occurring.

With good weather, come more people outside. Drive cautiously through the neighborhoods, watch for walkers, people on bikes, roller blades, skate boards etc. Also look out for me on the ATV, as I will be on the side roads checking neighborhoods and saying hello to the ones that venture out into the pollen.

Practice and games are starting up at the ball fields so you will see more people around the parks. Be sure and drive slowly around parks and neighborhoods. Also, pedestrian and bike traffic have picked up on 301 going to the Dollar General. Use caution while driving and also use extreme caution if you are biking. You must treat your bicycle as a motor vehicle and stop at all stop signs and red lights. Ride your bike with traffic not against. Use hand signals for any movement that is to be made within traffic, never carry a passenger on a bike. When crossing a busy intersection, dismount and walk the bike across, studies show this is safer than riding across. Remember to wear a helmet, if riding at night you need reflective clothing, a front light (white) that is visible from 300 feet and a rear light (red). Also when walking, walk against traffic, that's traffic coming at you. Make sure you are visible and be safe.

- ★ Don't text and drive

As always, if you see something suspicious or out of place call 955-1818 to have an officer dispatched to check it out. It is better to be safe than sorry.



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
