

Have you noticed the black plastic along HWY 301 towards Starke?? FDOT is repaving US Hwy 301 from



the Railroad Overpass to the Bradford County Line. The project started on February 24, 2017. It is slated to take 180 days and is a federally funded project.

The proposed improvements include milling and resurfacing of existing roadway, base work, shoulder treatment, drainage improvements, curb and

gutter, traffic signals, highway signing, guardrail, sidewalks and other incidental construction in Alachua County.

The Contractor for the project is V. E. Whitehurst & Sons, Inc. So be prepared to take your time going to Starke during the construction. Be Safe!!

Mayor Davis has been busy. Wednesday, March 15, found him leaving Waldo at 4:30 a.m. to be in Tallahassee at the Agriculture & Natural Resources Appropriations Subcommittee where he had been working with Representative Clovis Watson to get Waldo Bill HB2775 Waldo Wastewater Collection System & Evaluation - for \$500,000.00 passed. It made it through the first round. There will be several more trips to Tallahassee on this request. Friday, March 17 found Mayor and wife, Diana, headed towards Washington DC - regardless of the snowstorms and bad weather - to further try to find help for Waldo. Thanks Mayor for all your hard work.

The 2017 recipient of the 10th Annual Guy Hudspeth Award is Melanie Langsdale Aultman. This award recognizes an outstanding Alachua County Library District staff member.

Melanie, Senior Library Specialist at the Waldo Branch Library, has been with the District for 22 years, 20 1/2 years at the Waldo Branch Library! She has worked extensively with local schools and organizations.

Following is Melanie's response:

I would like to thank the Alachua County Library District Foundation for the honor of being selected to receive a leaf on Katherine's Tree. What I thought would be a short stint with the District has turned into twenty-two rewarding years. It is a pleasure

to represent all the creative, hardworking individuals that comprise the Library District in addition to support groups like the Friends of the Library and the Library Foundation.

Hired for the Waldo Branch in December of 1994, I had the opportunity to work for other branches and departments until its opening in June of 1996. It was a valuable introduction into how various components come together to provide the excellence for which we are known.

Working in a small space in a rural community is not without challenges, but the support of each department has been invaluable. The Waldo setting allows for participation in and coordination with local groups such as book clubs, the Community Center, Historical Society, W3C's (Waldo Concerned Citizens for the Community), Waldo Baptist Church and several summer camps for children.

My educational background has been put to use not only on a day-to-day basis with all ages but also in representing the District on the School Advisory Councils of both the now closed Waldo Community School and currently the Chester Shell Elementary School. Volunteers were recruited to assist in disseminating information about the library and its offerings and helping with providing classroom support through delivery of materials, craft projects and the scheduling of theater and other programs for interested teachers. For many years a visit from the Bookmobile was scheduled. I was happy to coordinate a yearbook for the last two years of the Waldo Head Start class.

## Waldo Motocross Carolyn Wade

The Sunshine State Vintage Motocross Club (SSVMC) sponsored its third annual MX des States competition recently at the Waldo Motorsports complex on NE U.S. Highway 301, Waldo.

The word "motocross" derives from the French word for motorcycle - motocyclette - and cross country - motocross, according to motosport.com website. While SSVMC is primarily a vintage race organization, there are also classes for modern bikes, youth, women's and three wheelers.

The racers of vintage motocross compete on machines mainly built in the 1980's and '90's. And the racers themselves can be vintage. Rocky Baumler, 71 years old, has been racing for approximately 40 years. He has a 1989 Yamaha and loves to build and rebuild vintage bikes. He could be the role model for the motocross motto: "You don't stop riding because you get old; you

get old because you stop riding."

Bill Pettit, Executive Director of SSVMC, explained it was a family-oriented sport with loads of camaraderie and sharing. "They are just a good group of people." Suzanne Leigh, Secretary/Treasurer, commented that she "has never met a person in the group that I didn't like." Suzanne and her husband, who races, are from Tallahassee. She explained that the SSVMC is a non-profit organization beginning its mission in 2014. The organization has grown from 79 three-member teams to 148 teams this year with participants trekking from across the nation. These teams, and their supporting families (this year nearly 1,000 people), generate tourism dollars for Alachua County. This event, combined with nearly 50 other events held at Waldo Motorsports, generates millions of tourism dollars annually.

During the event, a silent auction is held to benefit a local charity or organization in need of funding. SSVMC Board Member Mike Brown directed this year's silent auction. With the race based in Waldo, the proceeds were presented to the City of Waldo Parks and Recreation Department. Recreation Director, Erika Smith, accepted the generous gift of \$2,000.00 during the Awards Ceremony. Mayor Louie Davis, City Manager Kim Worley and Councilperson Carolyn Wade, were also in attendance. A potluck dinner was offered with a whole roasted pig provided by John Milligan, Director of Waldo Motorsports. Music was delivered by the band, Southern Burn.

The weekend was completed by another day of racing on Sunday.

## W3C's CELEBRATE BLACK HISTORY MONTH WITH BUFFALO SOLDIER RE-ENACTMENT

The Waldo Concerned Citizens for the Community (W3C's) recently hosted Walter Anderson who provided his interpretation of a Buffalo soldier. Sometimes forgotten, Buffalo Soldiers were an important aspect of the Civil War and later events in American history. There were approximately 225,000 Civil War blacks in 1863. In August of 1866, the U.S. Congress gave credence to the forming of the Buffalo Soldier Unit.

Calling himself Buffalo Trooper Anderson, he discussed the history of the Buffalo Soldiers interspersed with tidbits of homegrown wisdom. "The wheel has already been invented. You just need to do something to move the wheel along," commenting on the need for people, especially youth, to take action. A Vietnam War veteran, Anderson spoke of being in battle and remarked, "Whatever battle I am in, is a really big battle!"

Trooper Anderson came equipped with full Buffalo Soldier uniform including saber. His trusty horse, Sunny Boy, was there as well enjoying attention from everyone. At 70 years old, Anderson hails from the Alachua area and travels all over to teach others about his passion.

The W3C's hosted the event to celebrate Black History month. And as always the event was combined with a fantastic lunch provided by several community members. I'm talking about chicken, macaroni and cheese,

greens, pies, etc. An historical display of significant items such as African American dolls, could also be observed.

Kerry Dowd, Manager of the Waldo Library, was on hand with crafts for the children and assisted by Melanie Aultman, Librarian. Mayor Louie Davis expressed his thoughts; accompanied by Diana, his wife. City Manager Kim Worley helped assemble displays and assisted wherever needed. Councilman Irvin Jackson and wife Mary were present as well.

Appropriately, a lyric from Bob Marley's song, "Buffalo Soldier," sums up the day:

"If you know your history, then you would know where you come from."

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

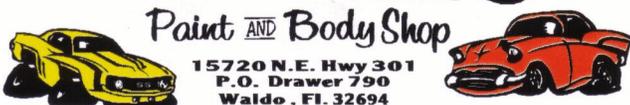
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


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
