Ham Pot Pie

NEED LIST

- 1 HAMBONE WITH MEAT
- 4 LARGE POTATOES, SLICED THIN
- 4 EGGS
- 3 CUPS FLOUR
- DASH OF SALT

Put ham bone in large pot,

simmer 1 hour. Remove from pot, put in oven proof bowl, put in warm oven.

While ham is cooking, mix beaten eggs, flour and salt together. Add more flour to make a stiff dough. Roll out on floured board. Cut in 2" squares. Bring broth to a boil. Put a thin layer of potatoes, then squares, then potatoes, then squares till all used.

Simmer 30 to 45 minutes. Eat with a salad

We ZUMBA. Do you? If you want to ZUMBA come to the Waldo Community Center on Thursday's, 10:00am – 11:00am. Wear comfortable clothes and tennis shoes.

Yard Trash.....do not put any other kind of trash with your yard debris or the garbage truck cannot remove it. Limbs must be cut into 3ft pieces; leaves can be bagged or put in old garbage cans. They will not remove whole trees. Yard trash is limited to trimmings, leaves and smalls branches. If not in compliance, it could result in a fee from the City.

It is hot...use caution so you do not have a problem....Never, no matter what, leave children or pets in the car, drink lots of clear liquids. Avoid overheating.

Water bills are due on or before the 10th to avoid the \$7.50 late fee and by the 20th to avoid cut off. If you pay by

cash, **KEEP YOUR RECEIPT.** We have people who thought they paid, paid with cash. We have no record. They have no receipt. Therefore the bill is still due.

It is hot out there. The Alachua County Health Department wanted us to share this information with the Waldo Citizens. Have a happy and safe summer. Please watch out for the kids on the road ways.

Heat stroke and heat exhaustion are the primary heat-related illnesses people suffer when the body's temperature increases. Citizens are urged to stay inside air-conditioned rooms or out of the sun when possible and drink plenty of light-colored fluids. Additionally, citizens should never leave children or pets in vehicles, as the temperature inside a vehicle can reach deadly levels.

Warning signs of heat stroke vary but may include the following:

1. An extremely high body temperature (above 103°F)
2. Red, hot and dry skin along with a rapid, strong pulse
3. Throbbing headache, dizziness, nausea, confusion or unconsciousness

Warning signs of heat exhaustion include the following:


1. Heavy sweating, paleness, muscle cramps
2. Dizziness, tiredness, weakness
3. Headache, nausea, vomiting, or fainting

Citizens should limit outdoor activity to morning and evening hours, wear light clothing, and if exercising or working outdoors, rest often in shady areas.

THE FREEDOM TRAINS: TOURING AMERICA TO INSPIRE OUR NATION

Twice in our nation's history there has been a special train to travel all 48 contiguous states. These trains were rolling museums, and contained exhibits to educate and inspire visitors. The first Freedom Train traversed the United States from 1947 through 1949, and the second in 1975-1976. This two-part article will explore the history, inspiration, and origin of these trains.

THE FIRST FREEDOM TRAIN

In 1947, US Attorney General Tom C. Clark submitted his idea for a Freedom Train to President Harry S. Truman. President Truman agreed that it was just the thing to refresh



post-war America's patriotism, and to remind Americans of their great heritage.

The US Marine Corps was chosen to attend the train, and their best and brightest were chosen for the job. The Marine Contingent was led by Col. Robert F. Scott, and it accompanied the train on its long journey throughout our immense country.

#1776 ALCO PA-1 was a locomotive built especially for this historic train. A diesel locomotive in the age of steam, the nation-wide tour of this train partly contributed to the dieselization of American rail. Able to fly past the coal tipples and watering stations of its steam predecessors, the ALCO PA handled all the extremes that the wide expanse of American terrain and weather could offer.

Painted brilliant white with red and blue stripes, it was affectionately named the Spirit of 1776. Receiving constant media and public attention, long lines formed to

see the train and its myriad exhibits... not to mention the Marines!

It is said that high school girls in Brooklyn spent their time in line planting red-lipstick-kisses on the white space between the red and blue stripes. This Freedom train even had its own song written by Irving Berlin and performed by Bing Crosby and the Andrews Sisters.

The train's exhibits included the original Bill of Rights, and the US Constitution. Appropriately, the train's first stop was in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania on September 17, 1947, and officially ended in Washington, D.C on January 22nd, 1949. It came through Jacksonville, Florida, on September 17th 1947.

Ministering Angels Of The Civil War by Lucy Roe Cook

First in a series of brief sketches of some courageous women who faced the perils of the front lines to relieve suffering soldiers:

Clara Barton

Miss Barton as a young girl was visiting in Washington City when the Massachusetts soldiers were shot down in the streets of Baltimore in 1861. She hurried there to take care of those first victims of the Rebellion. Her life work began.

Even then, so great was her personality and executive ability that she could go anywhere unchallenged. Military



trains were at her disposal. She remained on duty until she had marked all that were possible of the 18,000 dead heroes of Andersonville.

With health impaired she went to Europe to recuperate, and before she recovered she joined the Red Cross for service in the Franco-Prussian War. She returned at its close, a helpless invalid. After overcoming great difficulties, she had the satisfaction of seeing the United States become identified with this work, by signing the "Geneva Treaty", in 1892.

She became the President of the American Red Cross. It is written in the history of every national calamity since, as well as in every land where the Red Cross is recognized.


