

Does Your Vote Matter? (Excerpted from Rx for the soul) www.judithrich.com

In November, we are called to exercise one of our basic rights citizenship and cast our ballots for the candidates - at the national and local levels - we believe will best serve to lead us. Some people argue it's not worth



making the effort to vote either because they don't like the candidates or they don't trust government no matter which party holds the reins. "I'm sitting this one out," they say.

You might have a thousand reasons to justify your not participating in the electoral process. You might even tell yourself that your vote doesn't matter, that neither presidential candidate speaks the truth or speaks to the issues that matter to you. You might feel that the system is corrupt, that Wall Street runs the country anyway, and so why bother?

From that point of view, it's easy to become cynical and indifferent to the process, and many people feel exactly that. Whatever the outcome in November, nearly half of us will end up unhappy with the result, and the temptation will be to turn

our backs, pack up our marbles and go home.

But I suggest there's something larger at stake in our choice about whether to vote or not vote.

First, voting is both a right and a responsibility as a citizen. Our democracy is founded upon the principle of free and fair elections in which every eligible citizen cast a vote. We must work to ensure that our electoral process is conducted in accordance with this principle and that those who seek to derail the process do not win the day. It is our responsibility to protect the process itself, and that does not happen by withdrawing our participation. As messy as it may be, our participation is required.

Secondly, consider what happens to the human spirit if, as the steward of that spirit, you decide that your "vote" doesn't matter? No matter how justified one may feel for not engaging in the process, when we tell ourselves that our vote doesn't matter, the unconscious message being conveyed is "I don't matter."

One of the most commonly-held limiting beliefs that serves to obstruct our access to living a powerful, creative and satisfying life, is the unconsciously-held belief that "I don't matter." It's not like this belief is at the forefront of our conscious awareness. Most of us are completely unaware we harbor it, but its mark is left all over our lives.

Be sure to vote in November. If you're not registered, be sure to do that by October 11. Registration applications are available online and at City Hall.

The service is secure, reliable, and easy to use method for ACSO to get timely information to the public rapidly.

All alerts will be targeted geographically, allowing residents to receive localized, relevant alerts from ACSO. Nixle Alerts can be sent via Text, Email, Web, Social Media, and the Nixle Mobile App in an instant. Nixle is partnered with NLETS. The International Justice and Public Safety Network, for unmatched data security, as well as the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, the National Blue Alert Network, and Google for unmatched reach and two-way information exchange.

## **Random Facts**

### **The Miraculous "Far-Looker"**

Pretty much everybody in the world has heard of the Hubble Space Telescope.

Launched in 1990, it cost \$2.1 billion. Well worth the expense, since it has become the most

productive scientific instrument ever constructed, traveling over 3 billion miles and making over 1.2 million observations.

But it's replacement is already on the way.


The successor to the Hubble Space Telescope is the James Webb Space Telescope, which is scheduled to be launched in 2018 for an estimated \$8.3 billion. It will observe in infrared and will have a 21.3-foot mirror, which will allow for extremely high resolution to cosmic images.

#### **Bonus Fact:**

The word "telescope" is from the Greek tele, meaning 'far,' and skopein, meaning 'to look or see.' It was coined in 1611 by the Greek mathematician Giovanni Demisiani.

Galileo did not invent the telescope; he was, however, the first to methodically use it to peer into the night sky. Dutch eyeglass maker Hans Lippershey (1570–1619) actually invented the optical telescope (telescopes that see visible light) in 1608.

With the help of his telescope, Galileo discovered Jupiter's satellites and the craters on Earth's moon. He also used his telescope to look at the sun, which may have led to his blindness later in life.

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

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
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
